Jury country in, as part of Nam and wonderful to have you with us because you've all got a great project and Brooke as perhaps the well, I know organizer coordinator Etc. Perhaps you want to give just give a bit of an overview to start and then we'll go around the round the screens and round the zooms and talk to our artists about about their perspectives on it as well.

Okay. Sure. So the project is called Transmissions Trailblazers and it is a project. It's an emerging artist project where 5 trans and gender diverse artists have made short films and we're exhibiting them online this month. Well, absolutely the

Well, we'll talk we'll premieres. And we'll talk about how we access the premiere in these 2020 sort of times towards the end of our chat, but that's, I think a great start and that says the overview of what it's about. Perhaps, if I'll try to Sarah, Sarah. Do you want to tell us sort of how you got involved in the project and what your first thoughts were? When you heard about it?

How did I got involved? So I've been privileged to been audience member at a number of the Small Wonder Theater events going to a trans storytelling event. And then going to a very small theater production in Norfolk Troy and no sign of the covid X. I can't quite remember when when they were where it was last year or the year before. So, for me, it was a wonderful step.

To step in and be involved with storytelling. I love storytelling. I think storytelling is so powerful. I think it has that wonderful Duality that. It empowers the Storyteller but it offers the listener so much the, you know, it's that combination of Storytelling and and listening to stories, I think is so powerful. So this is what drew me into this space and to tell my own short story. Yeah. We'll definitely. I'm totally agree with.

You on personal stories? They're powerful, they communicate and do. It was well in sort of Earth time. It was typical calendar time. It was two years ago, but we were having a little joke just before we hit the airwaves that in Callen in narnian time or something. It seems like 200 years ago, pre covid was around September, or 2019, when Brooke you were on out of the pan and talking about a previous sort of Stage production, but Sasha over to you to unmute

And sort of tell us about your perspectives as to how you got involved and what Drew you in as well.

When two Small Wonder art form has a couple years ago, when I'm a very good friend of mine. Miss Catalina was when one of the performer and group took interest in me, and we became friends and Brooke off at me if I want to share my stories. And yeah, at first I didn't know why. I mean, I don't, I don't think people want to hear my stories, but I thought I'd this is a very good approach. It.

Fortunate is for me to actually share my story, about my mother, my birth mother, and also my mother who helped me transition in my transitioning process. So, if you want to listen, if you wanna hear more or you have to do with that, so that's, that's got me a bit intrigued in an okay. Yeah. Yeah. I think I'm a very open book person. So I guess,

My story is not as everybody knows about my story online. People can find it online on, but I don't think people know about my real story with my mom. And also my mother that I call my mother. She was my mentor to who mentored me throughout my transitioning process. So the both of them played really a big part of my life, so I thought I want to share their stories. So

This film is dedicated to them. So this is a story about them. So the title of my film is called a love letter to my mother. That's awesome. And look we do need I'm a Believer the more wise parents and guides we can have in life the better at any age and I think trans and gender diverse people. Yeah, definitely need that in in our lives. It's, you know, it's sort of its

Still can be the journey can have potholes. Let's say we've got a road but it's not paved in a freeway in a limousine ride. So to speak. And I think Sarah, you had some, you know, it seemed there was some thoughts resonating for you there as well. Yes. I, I'd like to feel that part of being trans. There's is awesome and wonderful, you know, discovering and being able to give expression to who you are, but it's the

Meaning that the journeys can often be quite tough and that there are lots of potholes and this is why I feel Community is so important to help. Help navigate to we to celebrate the awesome and beauty and to help navigate the potholes. Yeah, so we don't get a flat tire them, consume drive around them or something. Well, at least if we get the flat tire group of us are pumping it up again. Well, that's right or chipping in for a new tire or something. We could keep the analogies going.

So you've got two of you in there with your video stories or you know, and you mention though that there's five if any one of the three of you want to chip in and just say anything about the other three contributing artists as well. That would be awesome. And I'm give us some will say he teases so to speak. Yeah. So the other three participants are Archer Clark who's

Made a wonderful video out in forest in Regional Victoria and it's about his grandfather and his relationship to him and coming out and sort of. I think I don't want to put too many words and not just mouth, but maybe thinking about masculinity on what kind of man you want to become.

And then the other participant is next value, cos and they're from Melton and their video is about being diagnosed with Tourette's and a new, a logical disorder and how they've managed to find identity through that.

And then the last participant is May. I yeah, I wanted to make a video for this project as well and mine is about the animal kingdom and how different animals change their biology and change their sex. And I yeah, I just wanted to look at that because as an a gender person I often feel really disconnected to my body.

In times of transition, let's not really as important for me personally. My transition is it might be some other people. So I kind of I've been thinking about that a lot lately and I wanted to look at body maybe in a less literal human way and yeah, look to that Animal Kingdom, if, right. Yeah. The thing that's striking me about all the stories of the three of you here in the Archer and

And I'm sorry, I had a mental blank on sorry. Next, Nick. Thank you on an option. Nick's I beg your pardon. Yeah, Archer. And nix's stories is, there's diversity, of will say the trans and gender diverse Kaleidoscope. There's diversity in intersectionality. There's diversity of the stories being told. This is just, you know, awesome. And one of our talking awesome, one of our 3 CR. We don't have regular listeners over say

Any have awesome listeners. One of our awesome listeners Hoffa has come in and said we love hearing about people's stories. Well, I hope your heart sing out there Hoffler and all the listeners on this because this just sounds awesome offer. Also, just want to mention we opened up with Aretha, Franklin's think and by coincidence Hoffler watch the film respect about Aretha last night. Highly recommended a great female artist who pioneered in her way, but coming back on topic. This just it just sounds absolutely fabulous but of

As I'll say, I'll call it the lb.

We've needed our little local areas in, you know, in these times of lockdown, when we have any have our five kilometers or so, or whatever it is. My mom, a friend, actually feel them, her doing some work, and with her phone, and for my mentor, I stole some of her images online and some of the videos online. She has a lot. Mm. Because you do a lot of Press online. So I stole some of that. Yeah. So like I said, this is a video of film to Tribute to both of them. I

Thing I ever thank them. Enough coming from an Asian background. We do not say, much of I love you or I miss you. So, in my generation anyway, I think the generation has changed now, but, yes, so this is a video for me to just show them my gratitude.

And I just want to thank them for the things they have done for me and, and made me the woman that that I am now. That's just, you know, breathe.

Really? Awesome. I'm Sasha and very beautiful. And I told, you know, I agree that we well, we don't sometimes, you know, we lived. Well, you know, a lot of the world is dominated by masculine culture where heaven forbid, we express our feelings sarcasm there, all that sort of thing. And I just think it is really beautiful that you are, you know, are expressing that. And also one of our inline with sort of all sorts of thinking

Um, half-lives coming again. We need more diversity within diversity. He's loving all our guests on the show. So yes Small Wonder Arts is the website for transmission Trailblazers. It's just that it's just such an awesome project.

Reminds us in this time where we've needed connection and support of each other. I think it's very timely as well in light of the. Well, I hate to overemphasize it, but we know we've had this stuff go on in the last two years and it just reminds us, there is a sense of connection out there and I think that's just Ultra vital for all of the transgender diverse non-binary and I'll say plus communities. And because

I was going to say also Brooke. I sometimes think that a gender stories do get lost and, you know, sort of at some point, maybe, well, with something, I'll just say something to think about for now. So I think that the more, you know, as Hoffler said that, you know, sort of an awful is coming with a question. Actually, before we wind it up, but as Hoffler said, you know, sort of, we need more stories.

And more visibility and offers question is, which is a great one. Thanks Hoffler. Any prominent artists any of you admire that have inspired your your work in terms of video videography or anything? As well as the people you're making the stories about anyone want to LEAP in there.
