So the three of us attended a Melbourne, queer Film, Festival program and after that we got talking around how we could use our platform and our privileges as trans women to advocate for our community and we started talking and we discussed creating trans Pride March Melbourne back in.

And then 19, and it's something that we brainstormed then, and we have been working on since, and like, you said, Sally, there's been a couple of I guess roadblocks in the way, mostly covid related. And so, we have planned it each year, but this year, we finally get to put it out there to the world and have the first trans Pride march here in Melbourne. Yeah, excellent. Absolutely. And look, as a British YouTube wrestling commentary Channel that I listen to calls the pandemic, the, the global bastard. They originated from North England. It's certainly has been that and put a lot of things on the dampener on things and it's really important. I'm going to dive in, you mentioned, a very interesting point. There, you said your platform and privilege along with your two co-organizers. That's a really good thing to say but I'd like to expand on that tell us a bit more about how they thought your thought process is there.

So, I think, because baking around, using that platform that we are all quite outspoken, advocates for the trans community, and we felt the collaborating together. We could use that to elevate the voices of other people within the community. When I speak about privilege. I think that we all carry our own different levels of Privileges and us. Three. Trans women were able-bodied. We, I guess, would be deemed for lack of better words as passing within Society, we're all working.

So we have privileges within our own rise, even though we're all identify as trans women and other people within our community aren't necessarily as privileged as we are in that regard. And so we feel it's important to use our privileges to elevate the voices of trans people and to ensure that they're protected and ensure that they have places to speak and to pass the mic to them and create spaces that are safe and inclusive for them. Look, I really, really want to give a big

Well, tick of any sorts rainbow or otherwise to your approach there because I think too often privilege gets looked at will say one dimensionally rather than overall intersection lie. Now, and I'm I'm very, I think that's a so you've started from a really, really good place there. And that's why I want I wanted to clip to, really get that out there, which I hadn't expected. So I really thank you so much for that Rebecca, I think that's really important. So covid-19 say.

Don't like the phrase, you know, the one that gets used. I don't know if I don't really like it because I acknowledge lots of people are still affected by a covert such as immunocompromised and as we found during the worst of the 20, 20 and 21 that the more marginalization your face, the greater, the disparity, Union, Equity that existed. But we are at this, you know, we're probably around the best. We're going to be for unless there's a miracle vaccine that gets automatically gets rid of any variant from now on. So,

We're at that point now where we can do it once, we got, you know, and I think I might go on with that. I mean, are there any covid safety protocols in place for the March? So there will be a police presence but it will be very in line with lgbtqa+ inclusion and so there are going to be safety measures in place to ensure that everyone that is attending does feel favor, whether it's covid or otherwise and just encouraging people yet to wear masks, if they would choose to, yeah,

Well I'm glad I'm I'm glad you mentioned the otherwise. I mean, you know look let's be grateful for the fact that Melbourne slashed Nom is possibly one of the better places in so-called Australia and on planet Earth to be. But of course we know it's not perfect and there could be issues so we do have to face that reality. If I mean if there was no discrimination in the world

maybe we wouldn't be having a conversation now that it is really really important and I sort of let so let's go through the

So, we want to make sure that anyone within the deaf, or hard-of-hearing Community is able to attend the March and be able to see what's going on and to, you know, understand what's happening with the speaker's. Obviously, we want to make sure that anyone that may have any kind of physical limitations, or is within a wheelchair that they can also access the March we want to encourage them when they March actually commences to be at the front of the March. And the to ensure that the pace of the March is moving at their pace. And so they're kind of in the fourth.

On the March along side, the speakers and obviously the co-founders myself and stature and Cat brilliant stuff which leads into the sort of witness whatever we say, will say the win and who I suppose. So and we're let's start with where and start setting the the picture of that, where will the pride? The March will sort of but where's the wolf? Call it the Gathering point and we'll go from there.

Yeah, so the the March will actually commands out the front of the State library and we're encouraging people to get there at 11:30 a.m. for a 12 p.m. start. So what will happen is once, where everyone's kind of gathered at the front of the State Library, we are going to have speakers present. So we've got a quite diverse range of people within the trans and gender diverse community that identifying all different sorts of ways. We have allies, we have parents, we have a variety of people.

Within our communities baking and we have 15 speakers all together. It sounds like a lot. So what we're doing is were actually having two parts of the beaches created and at the front of the State Library, half of the speaker that we speaking then and then we will March from outside the State Library down. Swanston street will turn on Bourke Street and conclude the March out the front of the Parliament House where the other half of the speakers will continue to share their lived experience and

Ideas around what trans visibility means to them very, very awesomeness. Now, 15 speakers. That's I mean, that's quite it's a lot. So, you know, sort of, if you've got the list in front of you, run your finger down at random or land your finger on the page or elbow or whatever you want. And mention a few of the, of the people who are going to speak at either beginning or end. Of course I won't give them all the way.

But I will share some of them. So we have a I, shaima, who is a trans man who is also a professional Sportsman. He will be speaking. We have Andy Meddick, who is an MP who is an ally to our community, but has to trans children that we have missed Cairo, who is the trans woman of color and she's also an Entertainer here in Melbourne. And what I mean by that is that for older trans and probably I'll say for LGB maybe a I won't speak for anything beyond gender identity.

And sexual orientation. It could be for other intersections is that we perhaps have to climb ourselves and we haven't had a chance to do that in the first part of our Lives. Maybe we lose sight of what we put on Earth to do as a person and it's interesting. When because I call us call

this the top soil because, okay, we dig through the topsoil of gender identity sexuality. In my case neuro Divergence, those sorts of things, what happens.

Next. What do we do with our lives? And it's interesting, I've had in my own circles without people having to really go out of their way to approach me around, you know, sort of, I think it's close to six or seven people who have, you know, in will say 30 and above who affirmed their identity and does leads to lead to issues and thoughts about wasted time and looking. I'll look for me personally, I'm obviously glad I've been able to contribute

To our communities and hope that I still can in some way, but I sometimes wonder, was there Mort more to it than that? Just one of those questions we ask and I'm curious, if people want to message in overcoming weeks, if you are listening to this part of the show, if you're not, you're not going to know to do it but what do you think? And doesn't matter if maybe if you're a younger queer person I'm sure I'll go with queer. You know. Is that what do you think of that? Has it been the same for you that

Maybe the dealing with stuff, like, gender and sexual /, romantic orientation has sort of been a delaying factor in your life, even if you are safe 15 or 20, for example, you really curious to find out about that. So, something to think about, and then you've got all, we've all got stuff as a person. And maybe if you're someone, who's I'll just leave it as cisgender and heterosexual. But of course, there could be other factors. You don't have to think about things.

Um, it's not brought up for you. Well, you can move ahead with your life but you don't think about them, but everyone's got stuff as a person and what prompts us to tackle it. We all have our blocks so to speak that perhaps stop us being from 100% in the proverbial present moment and just something that, you know, is flying around my little mind at the moment anyway. Leave you with that, fill a philosophical thought.

One of the great philosophical performers is touring around Australia at the moment and I got to see him in at the Elisabeth. Murdoch Hall at the Melbourne recital Center on Friday, night, Colin Hay, how someone can just play sing and play and tell stories. Sing play an acoustic guitar, tell stories for two hours and have 1,000 people in. Well, the metaphorical palm of his hand is just amazing. He was truly amazing. I sort of if I have to watch a long movie,

A concert or something. I usually figured. I'd be the first to admit, not that there's anything wrong with fidgeting, or stemming hello to people on with various forms of neurodivergent. So you might want to do that, but I just sat there transfixed, he was utterly amazing. So I know it finished last week's show with the Colin Hay track. I think I'm going to do it again. Take it out

today, with wayfaring Sons, get those violins, and bagpipes and things out from the album of the same name. Thanks for tuning in to out of the pan. I'm Sally Goldner and I'll catch you next week in the meantime. Enjoy freedom of species and I'll catch you next week.

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
