Thank you, Sally. And what an honor it is to do my first interview with you. This fabulous show. Thank you for having me.

A great pleasure. And yes, we we wanted wanted to make you feel at home and welcome, I say to you President. We opened up with Billy Bragg and the power of the unit. That was great. Thank you. We some nice soothing relaxing, music to get into it and get into that Spirit of Union cooperation, which we need, but I know your time is short today. Your if I can be a little bit little tongue-in-cheek, you're still sort of getting the photocopier code to that camera office and all that sort of thing that you need. Not tongue-in-cheek. That is actually factual. That is there we go an inch.

Intuitive Community, radio, listeners of all genders, but first of all, I mean, just wanted to talk to you. I mean, go back to about 7 p.m. Australian Eastern Standard Time on the 21st of May 20-22 after what might be described as the shock, disappointment and other feeling words of the 2009-10 result just quickly, run us through your feelings as things began to evolve on Election night 2022.

Yeah, well, you know, we went taking anything for granted and we knew that it was going to be a close election. And if you know, probably not, everybody didn't notice, but I was watching the numbers as they came in from the very first counting foods that were being counted. And, you know, we didn't do quite so well in Tasmania as we would have liked to. And those were the first words that came in and I had a sick feeling in my stomach Sally, I can tell you, I thought, oh no, but then, you know, shortly after that half an hour or so after that. It's we started to realize that we

Really in the race. And when those those seats started piling up on the little red line kept growing on the Telly, we started to realize that we were no, we just might form government and there was a real Buzz and excitement and we were having a little bit of a gathering in the electorate at the bar in the electorate and it started to fill up with people when it looked like labor was going to win the election. And I must say, when we did get to that 76, it was oh my goodness. I can't

Tell you the feeling it was just wonderful, but that was a bit later on of course, but 75 and looked like get to 76 and 77. And when Anthony finally stood up and made his speech. I've got to say there was a little tear in my eye. I didn't quite realize the relief that flooded me that that sense of thank goodness. We can say goodbye to the Morrison government and we can actually start getting some really fabulous. Things done in this country. It was overwhelming. I started to

I couldn't help it and not the least of which is the area of health, and we know that your community is an area that's particularly vulnerable and needs, really special attention. And I can't wait to work with the community on, and I'm some really great initiatives. Well, yeah, that gets us right into the point of it. All and look, just got to say, share your feelings on the night. First Noel, NP majority, thank heavens. And then I came no minority and I mean, you know, it's not rocket science. This is to say that

You know, the desired results from a lgbtqa+ including transporting, have you were pretty in clear-cut and, you know, you've now touched on that it's been a horrible nine years. And now we've sort of moved out of - gear to seems like to neutral at the moment and we want to get into drive and accelerate safely environmentally cleanly, so to speak on lgbtqa+ issues, including trans and trans health. And there's quite a few Dimensions to that. We've only got a short time today, so I want to set an

You one thing that is vitally needed. It's been at the top of the federal transpacific wish list. For some time, is inclusion of trans health coverage under Medicare particularly, but not only limited to surgeries how quickly can we get moving on that because it's really, you know, become a very pressing issue for Trans adults. Yes. That's right. So, as you say, I'm getting my feet under the desk, but before we before we talk about, can I just just say how

Profoundly, sorry. I am to the community for what they've been put through and the Morrison government. It really was terrible. Right? From the plebiscite, right through to the most vulnerable people in our society being used his political football. So, I think that's the only way to describe it, particularly the trans Community Morrison, in my view disgracefully, just picked us, you know, some of the most vulnerable people that we know just own personal gain to make it in.

Election issue. And I I just like to start by saying it from my perspective and I'm pretty sure from the new Prime Ministers perspective. We can guarantee that that would never happen again from our side of Politics as much as we can control it and going straight to the question that you asked me. I do know that this is important issue for many people. There's no specific overarching MBS item, as you would know, that is specific and the

Moment. I do know the department is working quite hard on this at the moment. I've just got my feet under the table and I'll get brick raising it with them to see where we are up to. It is primarily an issue for the all the standards and the quality assurance. Isn't it access to Services is a state issue. But as you raise, the MBs is a national issue is the federal government has to decide this. So we are working on this. It is something that we're looking at. In the meantime. We have to make sure that if people are accessing these services,

Under the MBS that they can get there via existing months, you know, generally BS items gynecological, ones plastic and reconstructive Services Etc are ways that we can use the MBS for the community. So we are looking at it. I will be working with that and that and no one is more important than the trans community and the queer Community to be consulted and work with us and have a really loud voice in how we move forward with that. So, can I give you that Assurance from the

Being much appreciated because look one of the things that trans people have felt in particular and is that perhaps we haven't had access to the people in positions of influence for nine years. And that we haven't felt like perhaps a part of Australian democracy. And of course, the thing is, you know, look about in terms of who speaks for whom as they say, you know, I'm an assigned male trans woman. I don't know what it's like to have an assigned female body and therefore having a range of trans people.

And directly at the table being heard being respected. I mean, I remember very quickly story, a transman friend told me about a particular assigned, female body part that I'm even though I drop biology at the end of your 10 in 1980. I'd never heard of it. And so, it's been, it's that sort of level of detail that we need to make sure we get that Equitable health coverage including Medicare, but I am genuinely pleased to hear that. It's already being worked on by the department and they're sort of put moved in.

To drive on it. So to speak another group that faces, massive issues. And that still at the top of their wish list is people of intersex, experience, variation of sex characteristics. And during the week. We had the grand announcement from the ACT territory government of a piece of legislation, which was awesome. But if we could get that done nationally, it would save having to duplicate it to some extent eight times at every state or territory. And I know intersex, people are very keen on that as part of a whole range of how health issues.

You know, what's the situation there on a possibility of that and also an intersex consultative body as well? Sure, where we're at where I'm up to at the moment with that is that I do know the Australian Human Rights Commission. Released a report recently. You'll probably yep. Well and truly care of that and that the made 12 recommendations and that they are being considered like we've just come in now, so we'll have to take up that conversation with the Department of Human Rights Commission. Excuse me cell.

I'm going to have got a post-viral car for now. You mentioned it to me before and then I offer go and have a cop. So scuse me, not at all. And absolutely top of that list of recommendations is a really comprehensive multidisciplinary approach to this issue to make sure that you know that mental health is just as important as physical health that we have, you know a really broad approach.

How we deal with this? So again, I think National guidelines are going to be necessary here. There's going to be specific funding issues. And again, we want to work very closely with the intersex Community to make sure that we get that right? So stay tuned. I think I'll come back to you and I'm not quite, you know, when I'm got my skates on I'll be able to talk to you a bit more. Well, yes, you got that. That photocopy of code in the door pass and everything else. I'm still settling in which is fair.

Off. But it is they want to be your they will need to be a national approach to this. And so that's something I'm very interested in driving. Yeah. Yep. There's a couple of issues that affect a range of groups or if you want having these Lots but I'm and in the short term we have today, just a few Australia seems to be falling behind on approaches to blood donation. and now having a much more individual or merits based assessment. And currently there's policies that

The cisgender gay and bisexual men for trans women. For some non-binary, people do feel somewhat not inclusive and a stopping lots of blood donation happened. We can perhaps we move on that one as well. Yeah. This has been raised with us by a number of bodies, including lgbtiq Health bodies, of course, and so look again. I'm going to find the new be here. I'm really not exactly sure where we're up to on that but rest.

A lot of people are raising that issue with us and I don't see why we can't really start to see some changes there. And I'll do my very best to get back to you on that selling. I'm sorry that I haven't really got a definitive answer for you, but rest assured that it has been raised with us on many occasions by many people in the community and it is something that we will look at fear. I'll be fair to two business days. So I'm that's okay, but I'm just I'm going to go. I will come back to to that. No, no, it's good. It's good that you're flagging these issues because it really shows me.

The the areas of focus and, you know, we I can in my role now I can certainly move these things along. So thank you. Yeah. And look the other one that affect most of all the effects, all of lgbtqa. And I am being precise in living and intersex, is the issues of equality for students and teachers and teachers in religious schools. And that's one where we need progress to change, the exemptions in the sex Discrimination Act. What are their early thoughts on that?

Well, most definitely as you know, this was part and parcel of that awful time very recently before the election, the government put up some legislation that you know in part had some good things but it was wrapped around in it with some really awful awful things that we couldn't, you know, there's no way knowing that we were prepared to pass laws, particularly discrimination against trans kids in schools. And so our promise around destroying that legislation.

It was a good thing is that we would revisit this whole issue and work very closely again with the community with the unions. And you know with the faith groups to make sure that we get this right and that, you know, people should not be discriminated against for any reason. Really. And I think it was it was at at the SEC. I'm not sure who it was that

one said, you know, just because you're gay doesn't mean you can't teach maths and it shouldn't be part and parcel of it. So,

So it will we have committed to work reworking up legislation around this issue and this is, this is an area that you will see development. Now, with the Labour government. Excellent to hear it would be remiss of me as a by person and whilst I'm not asexual. Aromantic. They're also two parts of our own boat that get left behind again, you know, early days, but you know, we'd like to get I can't speak for a race and I'm not sure there are. I'm sure there are a lot of people out there who perhaps like to be involved. But certainly from the by

I can and we'd love to get some progress on by specific issues because we often face a razor so snow and also just visibility campaigned understanding the issues which would be very preventative. So similar again. Consultative mechanism for such groups. Yeah. Absolutely. You know, we will be sitting down and working out just how what that consultative mechanism is and how it will look. But there's there is absolutely no intent on our behalf to leave. Anybody out, I can assure you.

Given that in particular, that 3C house in radiothon month Community. Media is had a felt like a very short term existence. I'm thinking of community radio and also our cousins over on Channel. 31 44, who seem to be faced their existence, being threatened every year. And if there are no, it's not quite your portfolio, but and any thoughts on that as well. So, we can just

Get some stability and long-term planning for Community media. And we're coming up to the community broadcasters Association conference as well. Yes. Look, this is something that's very dear to my heart because, you know, from the Trade union

movement, you know, we've had a long association with Community radio and 3cr in particular, stick together programs been around a long time and my lovely partner was one of the first presenters on that later, but he got I've learned something. So no, we absolutely believe in the value.

Community radio brings and we've you'll be pleased to know that we did announce a big package of 29 million dollars for like four Regional local and Community media because of play, such a vital role really young musicians get their start there. Natural disasters knowing what's going on around in local specific areas and is so broad. The really how the value know, I know in the First Nations communities, the role of

Radio is so important. Jobs, people getting their, you know, learning this learning that had how it works. Just watching you push all those buttons and everything is okay and know how it all works etcetera. So there's going to be 12 million dollars specifically for Community radio, and that's really just to secure the base level of funding and that is kind of like if you like the our commitment to community radio to say that we want to see it Thrive and we want to see a build and we just love all the benefits.

Brings so you will see a commitment from us to community radio. Definitely absolutely awesome. And yeses in terms of pushing buttons as one of my early mentors at another Community. Station said, he caught who called he used to call it. He never did the paneling because he said it was like the deck of the Starship Enterprise. Was he comparison and you touched on the union movement? Which of course definitely is a part of 3 C ARS reforms and you know sort of protecting the gig economy.

Casual work, but there's a gap in the fair work act in that. There's an inconsistency between that and the sex Discrimination Act trans and intersex aren't in there and it would be really good to just make that consistent and fill that Gap. And so we're hoping we could get perhaps get that tongue as well. If you can talk to people like Mark Dreyfuss and others as attorney general to move that one. I'll have to have a closer look at that silly, but I'll certainly raise that with Mark Dreyfuss. Absolutely. Hmm.

Well, the last thing I just want to side because we've gone over are a great five to seven minutes, but there's so much that discuss is that, you know, you know, we don't we want to stay in touch and you just touched on the role of community out radio. We've

just touched a whole heap of lgbtqa+ issues that barely got a mention in the last two months and I'm sure there's lots of other community programs on 3cr who would love to have a chat with Labour ministers, and assistant Ministers of All Sorts, you know, and I hope we can facilitate that as

Well, and just keep keep the communication lines open. And I think that will be from the point of view of lgbtqa+ including trans and probably many others. Very reassuring to know that we're genuinely feeling part of Australian democracy again. So handy, that that would be great. I would be honored to do that. And, you know, programs like yours really do reach deep into the heart of very well at the smaller parts of of society that I think, as you say,

Native voice and radius a great way to do it and I'm very, very happy to come back and have a chat to you Sally anytime, cool. Alright. Well, that is very, very awesome. And also, there was one other question. I did want to mention and that is that the group, The Greens Independence have large numbers in both houses and they've got, I'm just going to be fair. They've got some pretty good policies on lgbtiq, right? Plus between them. I just want to make sure that we can get closer to across partisan approach rather than the wedge tactics of the last nine years, and I'd love to see

You know them involve so we can just get it done. Yeah. No, I agree. I think you'll see a new era of politics with Anthony Albanese. He's the Prime Minister and one of the very first interviews he gave he said that he wants to work in a in a consultative way with the crossbench. It's a perfect chance for us to get some very Progressive policies through. And I think you'll, as I said, I think you'll see a new way of politics with elbow. As the Prime Minister. I'm really looking forward to to that.

All right. Well, look, I think that's a great night to finish on and you've got a packed packed schedule as well. So really appreciate your time Jed. Thanks very much, and I'll catch you later. The advice that I would give, I think it's actually natural that we get from athletes is just keep your fluids up. I do drink a lot of water. I think that's just like a natural intake nowadays. I always tried get a liter a day. Even if you not getting any exercise in. I do recommend exercise as well because that helps with the mental aspects of things even just walking 30 40 minutes every day doesn't have to be a fast. Pace doesn't
